About this Survey

Aim

The aim of this survey is to find out about your Rural Clinical School (RCS) or rural rotation experience. We are interested in your feedback and your thoughts about whether attending an RCS affected your interest in rural practice. This information is important as it will help to improve RCS/regional programs to better suit students' needs.

Students at Rural Regional Medical Schools (Deakin University, James Cook University, Australian National University and University of Wollongong) should interpret the term "RCS Experience" as the most senior year-long rural placement they completed during their medical course, and answer "RCS" questions in relation to this long-term experience. Additional rural (and regional) clinical experience should be recorded in Section 27 of the questionnaire.
